The following week we were joined by Ben, leader from Thursday Cubs, who did a presentation of his expedition challenge for his Gold Duke of Edinburgh. It was very engaging and the Scouts asked lots of interesting questions.

As part of the Scout challenge badges, the Scouts have to carry out a series of household tasks, which we simulate. This quarter, the Scouts learnt about different types of lights bulbs and how to change them, they learnt about washing labels and how to iron (including ironing their own neckers) and lastly about different types of house thermostats and how to set them.

With our weekend camp coming up with Wednesday Scouts we used the opportunity to cover more skill badge requirements, this time the Outdoor challenge. The camp itself was a great success with

the Scouts enjoying activities such as air rifle shooting, archery, trampolining and the cresta run.

Each year we try to find a new way of cooking pancakes for pancake day. This year we found a new activity of cooking them over a candle in a cupcake metal foil case suspended

> with clothes pegs. Akela Teresa from Monday Night cubs liked the idea so much she decided to stay and watch and, of course, help out. All the Scouts managed to cook and eat one as well as having a normal size one cooked with a camping stove.

> Mother Days gifts was next on the agenda with the troop designing bags for their Mums

or whoever else they wanted to give them too. The Scouts used crayons to design a print onto sandpaper which they

then ironed and printed onto a bag. You have to draw the design on the front of the sandpaper and then turn it over, put onto the material and iron. We hope everyone who got one enjoyed their gifts, plus it covered some more badge requirements.

To end the quarter, the troop took part in in team activities including a

trading post and also a trust-games night which saw some of the troop walking around the rest of the troop

holding a rope. Last they went out on an egg hunt just before easter collecting an easter egg at the end of the night.

#### **Explorers**

This quarter, the Explorers baked chocolate chip cookies, working towards our chef activity badge We were provided with a recipe and ingredients, then we individually produced our own batches using equipment brought from home, working together in groups. In the end, everyone left with full stomachs and sticky fingers, bringing home mountains of cookies for the parents to gorge on!

We were also privileged to have visitors from Bramcote who taught us much-needed fire-building techniques, including methods of fire lighting, and building different types of fires. For example, long fires (two parallel logs with a fire built in the middle) are best used for keeping warm, as they burn for a long time, and are also good for cooking over. No more winter camps spent huddling over a single ember!

From November to February, a team of us explorers decided to do a fundraiser for Coventry and Warwickshire Mind to complete the community impact badge. The team consists of Joseph, Kylan, Burt, Henry, and Joshua. We decided to fundraise for this charity because mental health is a sensitive topic due to it involves deeply personal experiences and emotions. Unlike physical illness, mental health conditions are often less visible, which can lead to stigma and misunderstanding. Additionally societal attitudes and cultural beliefs about mental health varies, further complicating discussion around it. People may fear judgement or discrimination if they open up about their mental health struggles, which can hinder seeking help and support. Moreover, the complexity of mental health issues and the diversity of an individual's experiences make it challenging to address in a one-size-fits-all manner, requiring respectful conversations. We decided to set a target of £500 we smashed it by the end of January with £743 as our final total. During January we split up into two teams and we handed out leaflets in Nuneaton town centre. On the 3rd of February, we completed a 5 km run.

In February we went for an overnight hike around Nuneaton and surrounding areas. We planned our route and figured out bearings a few weeks in advance and we started at Shenton and then hiked back to the HQ. We met at the HQ at 7 and began our hike at 8 pm after we got a minibus together. We were put into 3 groups of around 3 or 4 and we set off equipped with maps and compasses. On our journey we walked along dirt tracks, fields, roads, and canal towpaths where we encountered different wildlife such as birds, frogs and even a deer. We met with leaders at 3 different checkpoints along the way and Barbara met us at the HQ with hot chocolate and food which we were all very grateful for after our long hike. We were walking for between 5 and 7 hours with the earliest group getting back at 1.30 in the morning and the latest group getting back at 3.40 in the morning, we then stayed the rest of the night at the hut. This was a great opportunity to bond and get closer as a group and we all thoroughly enjoyed it. It helped to develop our navigation, communication and our team building skills and was a brilliant night all round.

Our inevitable pub games night was a little different this quarter as we were hosted by 1st Bramcote. This also added variety to the games played and included table tennis, air hockey and table football. Thank you to Pumba for organising this.

Another group also covered their Community Impact badge by organising a litter pick at Chetwynd school. A lot of litter was collected including a garden light that had been thrown over the fence, and the school staff were extremely grateful.

We have four new members this quarter making a total of 19 in the unit plus our two friends from Bramcote. Welcome to Sam and Felix from Tuesday Scouts, James from Wednesday Scouts and Oliver who has joined us as he has friends in the unit.

Last but by no means least, we have presented four top awards this quarter. Firstly a belated Young Leader belt to Matthew who completed the requirements prior to his finishing with us due to becoming 18 in October. He is now working towards being a fully fledged leader

with Monday Beavers. A second Young Leader belt went to Dan who is continuing to

help out at Friday Beavers. Dan also achieved his Platinum Award along with Henry and these were presented by our District Commissioner, Steven. Well done to all of you!

#### **Wednesday Scouts**

This quarter, Wednesday Scouts have spent some weeks learning stop motion filming. We downloaded a free software onto devices and then used them to make short, animated films. We started by building film studios from cardboard boxes and learning how to use lighting. After

spending time storyboarding our films, we made props from cardboard, Lego and other toys and then actually filming our pieces.

Finding that it can take up to 30 minutes just to animate 10 or 15

seconds footage proved quite a challenge, but we were really impressed with the variety of storylines, props and practical effects that the Scouts were able to achieve in such a short time – we may have some budding Film Directors

among us!

Then on the final week we had our own film night, complete with popcorn.

Starting with the basic free app, some of the troop have since chosen to upgrade their app to include sound and many other features and are now enjoying a new

hobby.

We worked towards the Fire Safety Activity Badge as the Scouts created their own Fire Brigade and rallied to tackle various simulated pieces of paper!) with the appropriate fire

extinguisher. The leaders were very impressed with the amount of fires that were successfully matched and extinguished and we finished the evening with a joint fire drill with the Explorer Unit. Earlier in the term we ran Winter Camp as a joint event with Tuesday Scouts – the Scouts were mixed in their teams and took on many challenges over the camp, including the Obstacle Course, Cresta Run, Quiz Challenges, Gladiator Duelling and Archery – all of which earned them points during the course of the camp. As we were the only Group on site we were able to have a massive Camp Fire, with campfire songs and activities near the roaring flames! The Winners of the camp earned very special woggles – uniquely hand-turned wooden woggles from retired oak barrels in Ireland.

This Quarter we welcomed Elliot and Toby from Cubs, Elliot has now been invested, Toby will now be invested after Easter, as he wanted to go on one last sleepover with Cubs before moving up. We hope you both have a brilliant time with us.

Sadly we also said goodbye to James too. James has been with the group since Beavers, we have had the pleasure of seeing James grow into a keen, charming, witty and confident young man. We know James will do well as he moves to Explorers and is also now one of our amazing Young Leaders working with his old Cub pack.
